

Rosh Hashanah is here! It's a new Jewish year.

The new year is 5774 and I am going to celebrate.





When Cantor Sam takes the Torah out of the ark, it will be time for dancing and more singing. The Torah will be carried around the Grand Ballroom. I might see some people touch or kiss the Torah because it is very special to many Jews. Cantor Sam will open the Torah and read a part of it. He'll explain the words and what they mean.

I may want to do an art project by myself or with a partner.
